

Regular Minutes of the City Council

Monday, September 12, 2022 --- Meeting at 5:30 p.m.

CALL TO ORDER THE PRE-COUNCIL MEETING: Council President Colvin called the Pre-Council Meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. on Monday, September 12, 2022, in the Council Chambers of the Municipal Complex. Councilman Tapley, Councilman Hardy, Councilman Eric Brown, Councilman Chris Brown, and Councilman Keel were present.

Absent: none

Others present included: Mayor Baird, Amanda Thomas, Teresa Moten, Doug Jones, Jennifer Carlisle, Chris Hardy, Henry Foy, Dana Fuller, Al Jones, Miles Hamlett, Piper Barnett, Tammy Johns, Scotty Price, Chris Cousins, and others.

During the Pre-Council Meeting, department heads discussed several agenda items:

Council President Colvin reminded the Council that they have discussed the proposed ordinance (2022-25) during a couple of meetings in the past.

Scotty Price, Revenue Manager informed the Council that part of the proposed ordinance (2022-26) will set the issuance fee to automatically update based on state regulations. The other portion of the ordinance is to update the business license schedule and fees.

Jennifer Carlisle, Nutrition Center Manager, spoke to the Council concerning the City selling the Bud Porch property to Lake Martin Brewing Co. (proposed ordinance 2022-29). The building will be transformed into a restaurant/microbrewery. The goal is to have a nice place for citizens to eat during the times when other restaurants downtown are closed.

Amanda Thomas, City Clerk, informed the Council that the proposed resolution 22-88 to authorize the mayor to execute an annual agreement with the Community Action Committee, Inc.

Miles Hamlett, Purchasing Agent, talked about awarding Bid 22-17, Annual Chemicals (resolution 22-89). Prices are up but the increase was expected. This is included in the FY2023 Budget. He informed the Council that the proposed resolution rejects two bids because the companies that bid could only commit to a 6 months contract instead of the 12 months that were advertised.

Chris Cousins, Municipal Consultants, briefed the Council on awarding Bid 22-15, Multi-Agency Wastewater Solution Project "A" HWY 63 S Sewer Force Main SRF Project CS010329-05 (resolution 22-90). Bids were comparable, but the largest difference was in the electrical portion. He recommended the bid be awarded to Adams Construction.

Council President Colvin informed the public that resolution 22-91 to authorize the mayor to execute an agreement with Home Energy Supplier Agreement with Low-Income Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is an annual agreement.

Al Jones, Community Development Director, spoke to the Council about authorizing the mayor to file a pre-application and application for state and federal funds for apron expansion and taxi lane construction project at the Thomas C. Russell Field Airport. Mr. Jones described the current issues with airport parking and the increasing volume of business at the airport. He stated that the outside funding will pay for most of the needed improvements. The city would have a 5% match requirement.

Miles Hamlett, Purchasing Agent, spoke to the Council concerning resolution 22-93 to declare personal property no longer needed for public use. Mr. Hamlett expressed to the council how the city is not getting the best return on scrap prices. If the said resolution is approved, the city can sell unneeded equipment to Turf Control, LLC, and receive credit toward the purchase of new equipment.

Al Jones, Community Development Director, briefed the council about resolution 22-94. The Russell Legacy Project can't request grant money for a sewer pump station because only cities and governments can apply for a CDBG grant. The city will apply for the \$450,000 grant for said project.

Hearing no further discussion or questions, Council President Colvin ended the Pre-Council Meeting.

REPORT FROM STANDING COMMITTEES:

Finance: The city clerk vehicle sold for \$3,740. Lake Martin Coffee abatement has been paid and is up to date. Cityworks PLL is in the works to get implemented.

Public Safety Committee: Alexander City Fire Department is hosting a week-long ROPE training class at Fire Station 2. Personnel at ACFD would like to thank the Council and Mayor for approving the pay increase. We still have the blue 911 signs available.

Utilities Committee: Light department is training in first aid, CPR, and AED's. They are also trimming rights-of-way and easements.

Parks and Recreation Committee: Flag football started today. Tackle football starts on September 22, 2022. The golf course is over \$80,000 in revenue compared to this time last year. Jet fuel is at \$150,000 this year. Profit is up \$50,000.

Public Works Committee: Weather permitting, we hope to have a contractor in here later this week doing "spin casting" on a cross drain running under Coley Creek Road. Spin casting is a new technology that will allow us to make the necessary repairs to the pipe without excavating down to it, saving us from closing that stretch of road and forcing residents to detour. The costs of both options are comparable but this saves public inconvenience.

Buildings and Properties Committee: Appreciate the across-the-board pay raise. The library is preparing for Trunk or Treat. September is library card sign-up month. All is working on 9 grants for the city. There are new developments and they are still working on getting rid of abandoned buildings.
